My goal for vintage school is that my car and I must still be running for the practice starts to graduate and then race the same weekend. My advice to the driver looking to attend school, make sure your safety gear fits, practice getting buckled in by yourself, learn a routine, make sure your race car battery is fully charged and runs and if you will be attending school without any crew, learn to refuel and check your car over quickly and efficiently!

There is so much to learn, don't think that the books you have read on driving skills, apex, braking and passing will make school easy, who knew that there were so many track volunteers that need to communicate with you! People need to get you to the false grid, people need to know your intentions while on the grid, people need to tell you about the track conditions while you are on the track, (you WANT to know as well), then you need to learn how to communicate with other drivers and how to communicate with people again to get off of the track.

“grid time bears no semblance to any time you may know”

That is the truth. A show of five fingers must surely mean that it is either 30 seconds to the one-minute mark or that it is five minutes until they need you to be ready on the grid?

“racing is a lot like dancing...communicate”

Yep, and I don't dance very well, lets see how this is going to work! I can't even hear if my car is started after I put my helmet on. I get it, the grid marshal is crossing his arms to let me know that he is afraid of my car...oh, ok, he wants me to show him that I have my arm restraints on, whew!

More advice, at school, try to pit near where the classroom instruction will be held. Unless you are training for a marathon, you will find that after you are done with a on-track session, you will have 2 minutes less than you need to get the gear off, fuel the car, check wheel torque and air pressure and get over to the classroom for debriefing! How was I to know? I wanted to pit in the north forty so that I would be out of the way of others while I struggled with my trailer!

The student should also seek out advice from instructors or experienced racers at the track who are driving the same make of car as you; ask them to look over your car, I gained years of tips in only hours and I can say that I am faster and safer because of them! I also learned how many spare parts to bring for a race weekend, now I am going to need a larger car hauler!

“Drive the car, cause the alternative is really bad”. Sure is. If the car is driving you I figure you must be spinning and that can't be good!

Finally, graduation, of course that's after my instructor, (another source of speed and tech tips) has offered his time to show me the ropes as I learn them. Now, I get to race all in the same weekend, are you kidding me? Warning, grinning ear-to-ear does make it more difficult to properly get your helmet to fit!

Continues like this; Practice again, work on 1 turn at a time, quicker yet, seek advice, oops, check car, practice, oops again, assist other student, qualify, race, race? Yes race! False



grid, grid up, pace car pulls off, side-by-side, final turn to green flag, scary, holy ....yes, I see you there, wow, that was my brake zone you are in, remember to breathe! Steady, ok remember what I learned about this turn, now I begin to pass a few cars, starter holding 1 finger up, what was that for? Oh yeah, last lap, no way! Race ends way too soon! I watched the gauges. I watched the other cars. I watched the corner workers. I even had some time to watch what I was doing! Words cannot describe how it feels to be a part of vintage racing!



2 days of school, 2 days of racing, that was great but it is only the start of a lifetime of dreams and memories, priceless! I did learn that the weekend is not about the cars. It is not about the drivers. The weekend is about the friends you meet and the fans that walk in the pits and tell you how excited they are to see your car out on the track!

In the quest for figuring out why the tri-carb is running warmer than it should, I've had the radiator recored and checked the thermostat (160 degF, sleeve type) and reset the timing. I'm sure the 85 degree weather doesn't help. Flushed the engine block and installed new coolant with Water wetter. Installed a Texas Kooler fan from Moss. Water pump? There ought to be a better way, but I'm thinking flow meters, oxygen sensors, and thermocouples. In the better news department, Jim Frakes and I replaced the original 4.1:1 differential with a 3.54:1 I bought from Walt Nelson. I like it!
