On the 9th, we arrived in WACO, after a delay in DFW while a storm passed thru WACO. Yes it was hot, but we quickly learned to stay in shade, any shade, anytime. David Verrill drove our Durango and pulled the trailer with his car inside and had an air conditioned and safe ride.

Conclave WACO had a small crowd of 91 registrations but a very lively crew with help from three Texas clubs made it a good time. Hospitality included a very talented guest speaker from the local McLennan Community College. His knowledge of the history, excellent speaking skills and enthusiasm for his hometown was overwhelmingly received. His description of the single-span, 450 foot long, suspension bridge crossing the Brazos River WACO made it more interesting as the Bridge and park were right across from our host hotel. It opened in 1870 specifically to carry cattle across the bridge at a princely sum of 5 cents per head. The location of WACO along the Chisholm Trail made it ideal for a crossing in place of a ferry which took much longer and certainly more dangerous for the cattle. The Bridge became the focal point of our **car show** on University Street and later, a **party on the bridge**. It is a traditional party place in WACO for many events.

Monday's car show was light on cars but long on great looking cars including an unusual amount of very nice Bugeyes. In fact, for the first time in my memory, a beautiful black Bugeye took **Best of Show**.

The Party on the bridge in the evening was a hit as it was more like the major social event of Conclave, just talking to people you may have not met before and seeing old friends.

Tuesday's Gymkhana and speed run were held at a local military airport that is still in operation. In fact, we were not allowed to take pictures if the background included a certain area building. Of course, it was hot in the sun and not many airports have trees, but tents provided enough shade. The course, as I understand, was exceedingly long and difficult, according to drivers who got very lost on the Gymkhana. The speed run was too far out for me to walk in that heat and no shade, so pictures are few.

Lunch was downtown in the Hippodrome theater followed by a viewing of some old Healey Movies, thanks to Ben Moore, ably assisted by Tadd Roberts.


Tuesday was also the scene of Racing Paddock Day, in the South Parking lot. A very special group of racing Sprite's were on display, the last racing Healeys to be built by the factory. Interestingly, they were formerly owned by a gentleman named Scott Helmsley (?sp)_ who passed on a few years ago and the cars were purchased from his estate. A third car in that estate was a red Square Body Spec Sprite race car that I had purchased (and still have) some ten years ago from his widow who had a home in both Houston and Noblesville. I was able to talk to another gentleman there, Roger Williams, who had helped Scott build the car and told me its history and the features (and expense) that went into the car. 1275 engine with special pistons, 276 cam and a host of chassis improvements.



Yes, we did go to Magnolia Markets, just after standing in line to get into the bakery. Since we arrived early there was no line for the bakery but by afternoon it could be a 30-45 minute wait there. The market took about 10 minutes to see....... What gives with that place? Looks like a copy of Pier One.

More interesting was the WACO Mammoth National Monument. Between 1978 and 1990, the fossil remains of 16 Columbian mammoths were discovered. Their efforts uncovered a nursery herd that appears to have died together in a single natural event. Between 1990 and 1997, six additional mammoths were excavated, including a large male (bull). Crews also uncovered the remains of a Western camel, dwarf antelope, American

alligator, giant tortoise, and the tooth of a juvenile saber-toothed cat, which was found next to an unidentified animal.



Wednesday was a more relaxed day with the lively Pinewood Derby and Valve Cover racing. The valve cover racing will be back in 2018 and we have the equipment brought back from WACO. The Racing Sprites display continued in the AM with tech sessions in the PM.

Thursday traditionally is a Rally and WACO did not disappoint. Although we did not participate, a large group of the 91 registrations did go by as a member took pictures of each. It was a very short rally, which was merciful in the heat, especially in a Healey.



Thursday evening awards went off well. I can't remember who won what but winners will be posted in Healey Marque. Midwest club took the honors of the DMH award, and an auction completed the event.

Overall, it was a good Conclave, hot, but no one seemed to complain much. Just stay out of the heat.
